Dear ICS Members.

The nominations for the election of ICS President for 2001 are invited. All nominations should be duly proposed, seconded and received by January 7, 2001. No new nominations will be accepted on the election day. All members who have paid their dues by October 1, 2000 are eligible to cast a vote. Each member shall be entitled to one vote. The husband and wife in a family will constitute two votes. The election will be conducted via secret ballot, or via mail ballot in special circumstances as specified by the executive committee. Election for the President will be held at the first ICS meeting of 2001.

Absentee Ballot: The following are the rules for casting the vote in absence.

- The member seeking the absentee ballot should contact the Chief Election Officer (CEO) by email/phone and should request for the absentee ballot.
- After receiving the request, the duly signed ballot will be made available to the requesting member or his nominee. The ballot in sealed envelope should be returned to CEO on the election day or before though the same nominee.
- No voting through email is acceptable.

For decades, Indians have been immigrating to America in search of many things: better lives, joining their relatives, or even the simple hope of money, and the majority of us have been satisfied. There is a rapidly growing Indian population in America; in every one of my classes at school, there are at least two Indians, and in other schools the concentration is even greater. There are entire neighborhoods of Indians; nearly all of us know of the Gerard Street of Toronto, where it seems as if someone dropped a piece of India into Canada. Overall, Indians have been successfully integrating themselves into Western society, but there is a second factor that has not been carefully considered.

"Second-generation" Indian immigrants, those of us born in America, are in a curious predicament. 

in B's. Parents listen to Indian music that children see as a miraculous cure for insomnia, whereas children listen to modern American music that makes the parents gag. Parents chatter back and forth in their native languages of India when children speak English with the distinctive accents of an American. I am not saying that the situation is a constant war between the generations— it is anything but, as there are numerous common grounds upon which children and parents alike agree— yet there are conflicts that need to be resolved.

First, the grading situation. Sometimes, it is true, that kids get lower grades than their ability allows, and in this case parents are justified in disapproving, but the other situation is the true problem, the situation where the child "gives it his all" and still ends up with a B or C. Instead of shouting, complaining, or any other forms of expressing displeasure, work constructively, trying to isolate the problem and devising a method for solving it. And kids: try harder, instead of giving up.

Second, the culture situation. Parents need to understand that American culture is just as worthy of being a part of as Indian culture; kids need to understand the reverse. Believe it or not, there actually IS good Indian music out there. And if kids have an American accent and don't speak an Indian language, it's the language we grew up with, the language we speak in school, the language we use with our friends-just about everywhere. It's understandable if we have a difficulty using the Indian languages as well as English. Conversely though, kidsshouldn't shy from learning an Indian language and using it. It's worth it, in more ways than one. I am not saying that kids should "Indian-ize" themselves, and I am not saying that parents should "Americanize" themselves. A third point, a compromise of sorts, is the best situation to this problem. Parents need to recognize that a 4.0 GPA is not everything; kids need to recognize that school is an extremely important part of childhood. Parents need to see that American culture is a fascinating and rapidly changing phenomenon: kids need to see that Indian culture is an ancient and rich tradition, dating back thousands of years. While neither culture is superior to the other, adhering solely to one is denying oneself experiencing the other.

In conclusion, while neither country has a superior way of life, merging the Indian way of life with the American way is an excellent method of integrating oneself into American society while retaining your individual uniqueness.
